As the United States enters its third century the legal problems of the American Indian remain acute and ill-determined. Congress, which possesses broad power over Indian affairs, has established the Indian Policy Review Commission and charged it with investigating the current status of Indian legal problems and formulating recommendations for restructuring federal Indian policy. The present symposium surveys the historical and administrative context within which new laws would have to be placed, and explores a series of specific issues—resource development, compensation schemes, taxation, and education—affecting the economic and cultural bases of Indian existence. The purpose of the symposium is to pinpoint some of the issues and repercussions that will have to receive careful consideration in the development of new approaches to the legal and economic situation of the Native American peoples.
